10th Annual DEAN WORCESTER MEMORIAL CUP RACE SATURDAY 16 OCTOBER 2010

(RENDEZVOUS WHITEHALL CREEK <u>AFTER</u> THE RACE)

This is our *10th annual* fall race event in honor of our late founder, great sailor and friend Dean Worcester. As always, the perpetual prize is a pewter stein that Dean won for first place in the Governor's cup.

(There is a change this year~~Instead of rendezvousing on Saturday and racing on Sunday, we will be racing on Saturday and rendezvousing Saturday after the race in White Hall Creek.)

Saturday, we will race down the Bay a short way, and then back (the course chart follows). That afternoon/evening, we will rendezvous up in Whitehall Creek where the main stem angles off northwest. As always, the larger boats can take a few others alongside...Looking forward to a terrific turnout!

START: 1030 between the committee boat (HORNPIPE, sloop, Guff Gauld) and green can #1 off Whitehall Bay (L38-58.2N, I76-24.9W). Red flag. **PREP 1020,** white flag. **WARNING 1025**, blue flag.

COURSE: From GC#1 WB to red channel buoy "86" north of Bloody Point (L 38-52.0N, I 76-23.6W) to starboard; green outer West River entrance buoy #1 (L38-51.9N, I 76-26.9W) to starboard; **FINISH** with red Annapolis Harbor #2 (L38-58.6N, I 76-25.6W) close aboard to port bearing 290° mag. <u>Take own time</u>. Call in after the race to Van Nield, 410-268-6008 or email vnmnield@verizon.net. **TIME LIMIT** 1600. One boat finishing makes it a race.

HANDICAP: If you haven't raced with CTSA before, give Van (above) before the race: your name, boat name, length on deck, waterline length, rig type, and propeller type (no. blades, fixed/folding).

SAILS: Spinnakers, gollywobblers, mizzen staysails, water-sails now **OK**.

DEAN AVERY WORCESTER

(Encore printing in honor of the 10th anniversary of the Dean Worcester Memorial Cup Race-first published WL 10.8.09)

1915-1995

Alexander Pope observed: "...just as the twig is bent, the tree's inclined." Dean's progression from formative years, and throughout his adult life when he became increasingly incapacitated by Alzheimer's Disease, mirrored Pope's philosophy -- Early interests and hobbies were retained and refined over Dean's eighty years of living.

Dean Worcester entered this life on April 30, 1915, in Manchester, NH. From boyhood days, Dean was interested in flora and fauna; a backyard fishpond -- which he built and maintained -- occupied countless hours.



Interest in music came quite early; Dean played flute and piccolo in his high school band. As an adult his musical tastes evolved toward the jazz medium. He collected records by the already great and of those who were up-and coming. In an era when whites and blacks did little mingling, Dean became part of the Washington jazz scene; he knew a number of local performers personally and became a charter member of the still-thriving Potomac River Jazz Club.

New England winterscape offered ready access to downhill skiing, and Dean's early mastery of the sport was but preamble to decades of pleasurable skiing adventures on the East Coast, throughout the West, in Canada and in Europe. His long affiliation with the Potomac Valley Ski Club gave fellow members ample opportunity to respect the Hampshire man for his skill and fearlessness. He and his cronies were known to attempt anything that was not on level ground -- and to do so as fast as possible.

New England also provided convenient initiation to the water and to all the joys and challenges it offered. As a boy Dean designed and built himself a little boat -- this, in a sense, providing a prototype for all the vessels that would become a major part of his existence in adulthood. In the Thirties he designed and built -- then raced -- one of the very first three-point hydroplanes. This highly competitive man seemed to revel in "living on the edge." He would race hydroplanes professionally for a time. (He also raced sports cars.) Ultimately he embraced sail-powered vessels and purchased "Island Belle," Wirth Munroe's 1942-vintage 65' three masted, double-ended triumph. Dean renamed the "long, skinny boat" "Rebel". She would become an extension of himself. There were annual cruises to New England waters during the Seventies, with participation in races sponsored by the American Schooner Association. These adventures ultimately would be the inspiration for Dean and Bill Bolster founding the Chesapeake

Traditional Sailboat Association (CTSA) -- with the goal of providing activities, information exchanges, and camaraderie for Bay area sailors who enjoyed a love affair for traditional and classic vessels.

Of course life was not all hobbies and pleasurable pastimes. Dean graduated from Dartmouth in 1936, having acquired an academic background in both engineering and physics. He would spend the war years working for Electric Boat Company in New Jersey. Later on he came to Washington and was employed, until his early retirement, at (R&D) Harry Diamond Lab and the Bureau of Standards.

Our friend departed this life on November 24, 1995. Alzheimer's had taken an increasingly dramatic toll on his mental health since late summer. There had also been prostatic problems (relieved by recent surgery). Dean fell head-long down the stairs in the group home where he had resided since early autumn, fracturing his skull. He died several days later at Howard County Hospital without regaining consciousness.

Though we mourn the loss of a special friend, we do him an injustice if we fail to celebrate his life. Dean was, in boating jargon, a "one-off" design: brilliant engineer and physicist; consummate sailor; penultimate jazz fan; accomplished skier; solid citizen (active in teaching and patrol efforts with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary); voracious reader; sports car buff; author of witty limericks and loyal friend.
